



A Culture of Leadership

The best executive is the one who has sense enough to pick good men to do what he wants done, and self-restraint enough to keep from meddling with them while they do it.

The idea of a Culture of Leadership is relatively new.

The understandings that violence is not inevitable and that we are free to create new ways of being as individuals and societies have inspired and empowered many people and organizations around the world. Scholars, scientists, practitioners and educators have begun to look at the past to reexamine our history. They are uncovering and studying the aspects of human behavior and culture that are the foundations and heritage of leadership for peace and cooperation. Throughout history and throughout the world there is evidence of leadership and cooperation within families, communities, societies, and nations.

The World Health Organization (WHO) reported in 2002, that in the year 2000, 1.6 million people died as a result of violence: 815,000 deaths by suicide, 520,000 homicides, and 310,000 warrelated deaths. While the statistics about the presence of violence in the world may seem discouraging, they reveal only part of the picture. The WHO also stated in 2002 that "violence is a leading worldwide public health problem" and "based on evidence — violent behavior and its consequences can be prevented." This represents the part of the picture that is most often not seen.

Extensive research and development of programs have occurred in the areas of conflict resolution, violence prevention, and leadership for sustainable development. We know much about the root causes of violence and how to address those causes. Positive change is in fact happening. There is still much to learn, to research, and to do to fulfill the call for a Culture of Leadership for Sustainable Peace and Non-violence for the Children of the World.

Framework for Educating Towards A Culture of Leadership

Educating towards a Culture of Leadership can seem as if it is an overwhelming task, of immense proportions, not relevant to daily life, and attainable only at some far distant date in the future. Webster's Dictionary defines culture as "the ideas, customs, skills, arts etc. of a people or group that are transferred, communicated, or passed along, as in or to succeeding generations". Then Webster's continues, culture is also the "development, improvement, or refinement of the intellect, emotions, interests, manners, and taste; the result of this; refined ways of thinking, talking and acting."

The significance and pragmatism of educating towards a Culture of Leadership is to build the Societal capacity, the ideas, customs, skills, arts etc. of a people, that are transferred to succeeding generations, depends on patterns developed from the individual and the interpersonal to the nations, through the development, improvement, or refinement of the intellect, emotions, interests, manners, and taste, resulting in refined ways of thinking, talking and acting. Thus, through developing the physical, emotional, mental and transpersonal capacities of individuals, groups, communities, and nations in the understandings and skills of leadership.

Educators in every role, in every area, at every level can be part of creating a Culture of Leadership. Since, "culture creating" occurs at every level of society, whether your work is focused on the level of the individual, of community, of nations, or globally it impacts culture. No matter what age your students are, they are participants of and creators of culture. Most of this culture creating activity goes on without our conscious participation. To educate for a Culture of Leadership requires one to explore what is leadership and what is a Culture of Leadership?

In search of the definition of leadership, we realize that can't press the definition in to one word that may simplify the meaning because of reduction. Like other psychological constructs, leadership is a complex construct that is shaped and influenced by time and space, or we could say, culture. Culture itself is a complex variable that emerges as one of the issue to be recognized in social sciences, especially psychology.

Talking about culture which is more complex and abstract form than leadership, culture is defined as a complex concept embedded in many aspects of living and life. Some aspects involve material things, such as food, clothing, and houses. Some refer to societal structure form such as government organization and community structure. Others refer to individual behaviors such as religion and science (Matsumoto & Juang, 2007). However sometimes, people easily "force" the meaning of culture into narrowed context of country and race (Berry, Poortingan, Segall & Dasen, 1999; Matsumoto & Juang, 2007). When we discuss about cultural differences as a country, race, or even widen as east and west, then, we can say that almost psychological theory comes from the west. Nearly all leadership theories and research are conducted in western countries.

Leadership is a phenomenon that became a cross-cultural interest and also engaged scholars working in various disciplines (Mumford, 2011). Psychology is one of the studies that work on leadership. As our mission is to establish a culture of leadership mechanism that is accepted around the world without facing any cultural discrimination. One of the difficulties with the idea of leadership is that is seems to be an absence of something, which makes it challenging to visualize, think about, and educate for.

The "Astabrata" is ancient wisdom for leadership. As mentioned in the "Dynasties: A Global History of Power, 1300-1800 by Jeroen Duindam." Its principles are symbolized in the characteristics of nature. The word "Astra" means eight and "Brata" means behavior or guidance. Astabrata means eight natural elements that symbolize the leadership character (Simpaka, 2012; Yasustra, 2011). The eight natural elements that symbolized the leadership characters are earth, sun, fire, ocean, sky, air, moon, and star. So, we believe leadership is the combination of this eight characters and it will be also the Culture of leadership.

Explanation: The 8 symbols of the leadership characters.



Earth is a place for living creature to stand. Earth is strong, can hold all living being which live on it. Earth is generous or charitable; it gives chemical substance which is needed for plants to grow, gives food for human and animals; it gives everything that it has for living creature that stand on it. As the earth, a leader has to be generous and strong. Give all what he have for his followers, be a place for them to lean on.

Each natural elements stands for leadership character that a leader should have in him/herself.

Every subject matter as a reflection of our culture is directly related to this framework. Also, every educational setting: schools, churches, temples, mosques, community programs, universities, environmental education, adult education, etc. is an effective and necessary part of educating for a Culture of Leadership.

Educating Towards a Culture of Leadership

Educating for Leadership and cooperation is an open field of discovery and in every endeavor of discovery, of prime importance is the journey. We have a goal, which guides us along the way, but it is our every step that carries us to our destination. Educating for leadership and cooperation is the journey of our every step.

There is a longing within the heart that calls us to this journey. In answer to that call we begin to wonder, what can I do as a teacher, administrator, or parent to bring greater harmony into my classroom, school or family? At this point people often decide to give up (*It's too hard. It's too big a job.*), or to put aside the question (*I already have too much to do. I don't know where to begin.*), or to begin the journey that not only changes how one teachers, parents, or lives, but transforms who we are. (*I am willing.*)

Creating leadership and cooperation in our families, schools, communities and world is our destination. When we look around us there is much suffering, violence, and despair. As we walk the path of peace we are the convener of a Culture of Leadership. We are in the way to get recognition to Leadership to reach the millennium goal of sustainable development, and attention to violence and injustice. We create a world that works for all of us based on the principles of respect and the dignity of all life.

About the World Leadership Day March 7th



On December 10, 2015 the Newport University CED, Latvia Board of Directors and the Members of the Academic Council resolve a Charter to establish Bangabandhu Institute and declare March 7th as World Leadership Day. In association with PRME (Principles of Responsible Management Education) of the United Nations Global Compact to celebrate this day at all the participant member institutions around the world.

"As set forth in the preamble of the Charter of the Newport University, Latvia that the World Leadership Day will be observing every year from March 2016 to promote the power inside leadership to inspire all the citizens around the world from all nations. The date represents the day in 1971 when the Bengali nationalist leader Sheikh Mujibur Rahman delivered his speech at the Ramna Race Course Maidan in Dhaka to a gathering of over two million people. In the speech he proclaimed, "Our struggle is for our freedom. Our struggle is for our independence". He also announced the civil disobedience movement in the province, calling for "every house to turn into a fortress". The war eventually began 18 days later and the war finished in the same year December 16, in this war 30 million Bangladeshi people killed by the West Pakistani military. Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman became the Father of the Nation and first Prime Minister of independent Bangladesh. Unfortunately, he was assassinated including all his family members except his two daughters, who were out of the country on August 15, 1975 by a Pakistan supported intriquer military group for reestablishing their lost power."

"Considering that, through the declaration and proper celebration of a World Leadership Day, it would be possible to contribute to strengthening such ideals of leadership for Sustainable development and to alleviating the tensions and causes of conflict, both within and among nations and peoples."

The World Leadership Day "is a day on which all member institutions around the world observe a minute of silence at 10 morning local time at their classes."

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World Leadership Day Activities for Elementary Students



At a class meet have students take part in student input into how planning and organizing the activity.

- Exploring Leadership: Participate in the World Leadership Day through writing, listening, or expression. Leadership has many meanings and can be expressed in many ways. Explore what leadership means on the level that is most appropriate; leadership within one's self, leadership in the family, the classroom, the school, the community etc. Students can discuss, write, or illustrate their ideas about the different types and expressions of leadership. Include problem solving by having students think about what gets in the way of or stops leadership, and how to restore leadership.
- Identity, Unity and Diversity: Explore the concepts of identity, unity and diversity. Young students can draw or describe themselves and identify similarities and differences with classmates. On the World Leadership Day students bring their favorite cookies to share. Before eating the cookies, discuss what is alike and different about them. Connect the activity to the unity and diversity of the human family. Older students can explore their ethnic or cultural heritage and present aspects of the many backgrounds found in the class through music, stories, clothing, housing etc. Celebrate with a meal or different foods from one or various cultures.
- ❖ Learning about Peace: Read <u>Monday Morning Leadership for Kids</u>, by Evelyn Addis & David Cottrell. Follow the adventures of Baxter and Paw Paw as a wise grandpa teaches grandson Baxter about making good choices, doing the right thing even when it's hard, having good friends, encouraging others, being obedient, and doing your best. Beautiful illustrations and a charming story will captivate young readers as they identify with Baxter and learn about character through the messages Paw Paw gives Baxter on a sunny Monday morning. The characters are inspired by the leadership and peace teachings of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr, Buddha, Gandhi, Christ, Moses, and the Prophet Muhammad (pbuh), Banabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and other famous world leaders.

World Leadership Day Activities for Middle School Students



- Shared Responsibility: Introduce the World Leadership Day. Ask for student input into how to participate within the curriculum focus for March. Have students take part in planning and organizing the activity.
- ❖ Problem Solving, Media and Critical Response: Have students identify "What is violence?" Have students describe how they experience violence in their lives. Divide students into groups and list the types of violence portrayed in media, television, video games, music, and films. Share the results. Have students analyze and evaluate the role they think violence in the media plays in the lives of children, in their own lives, and in our society.
- ❖ Conflict Resolution and Cooperation: Discuss conflict and how students experience it and respond to it in their lives. Discuss competition and cooperation and how students experience both in their lives. Watch the movie <u>Chicken Run</u> and the <u>A Bug's Life</u>. Have students note and discuss the leadership abilities and how they are addressed in the movie highlighting cause and effect. Have the students note and discuss competition and cooperation in the story, again highlighting cause and effect.
- ❖ Human Rights: Explore the concept of human rights through the "Convention on the Rights of the Child". Have students discuss these rights as they pertain to themselves and their community. Examine another culture in a different part of the world and discuss these rights as they pertain to children in another community. Downloadable at www.unicef.org/crc/index framework.html
- ❖ The Environment and Natural Resources: Explore the interrelationship of humans and their demands on natural resources and how this is impacting the environment globally and in their community. Have students identify what their relationship to the environment will be. Have students research and propose a plan for their school that reflects their ideas, beliefs, and values.

World Leadership Day Activities for High School & University Young Students



- ❖ Shared Responsibility: Introduce the World Leadership Day. Ask for student input into how to participate within the curriculum focus for March. Have students take part in planning and organizing the activity.
- ❖ Conflict Resolution: Have students discuss what they know about and the value and effectiveness of nonviolent resolution to conflicts. Watch the movie <u>Gandhi</u>, from inauspicious beginnings as a lawyer in South Africa in the late 1800s, Mohandas K Gandhi's commitment to challenging injustice, and his doctrine of non-violent resistance, see him gain extraordinary influence with his native people and subject of Richard Attenborough's astonishing 1982 film and the documentary <u>With A Right To Kill</u>, 110 minutes or as a TV-series, four episodes of 28 minutes each, in collaboration with Peter Øvig Knudsen, based on his book, "After the Murder", 2003. Discuss the topic again after viewing.
- ❖ Career Choices: Invite professionals in the fields of leadership to come and speak about their work. Choices include mediators (court, family, business,), ombudsperson, community development workers, human/civil rights officers, peace educators, peace or conflict studies professors, non-profit directors or program service providers, social justice workers, humanitarian aid workers, environmental professionals etc.
- The Arts: Research and explore the role of art and culture and its relationship to Leadership. How does war and violence impact art and culture? <u>The Mother</u> is a novel written by Maxim Gorky about revolutionary factory workers. The book focused on the Russian revolutionary movement, while on a trip to the United States in 1906, he wrote the novel. After the defeat of Russian's first revolution in 1905, Gorky tried to raise the spirit of the proletarian movement by conveying the political agenda among the readers through his work. He was trying to raise spirit among the revolutionaries to battle the defeatist mood. How do we identify and protect humanity's treasures?
